## **Hospital School Room**



It has been busy in the schoolroom this term. We have been exploring past and present as part of our topic. Patients have explored Kings and Queens of Great Britain and celebrated the King's Coronation. Patients completed a collaborative project where a series of tiles were decorated to create a large portrait of King Charles.

Younger patients have explored dinosaurs as part of our past and present topic creating mosaic footprints. We have enjoyed having three patients in the schoolroom together.

Two patients created family hearts and we created art work that expressed love, individuality and friendship linking in with Pride Month.





Blossom: This term, we have learnt to write descriptively using adjectives, similes and personification. We wrote a setting description and a refugee story as part of a local writing competition. To write the refugee stories, we learnt what a refugee was and planned the story using story mountains. Also, we have been reading 'The Witches' by Roald Dahl. We are writing to persuade the witches to leave children alone and took part in a Witches afternoon tea party.

Cedar: We have been delving into the past and the star-crossed relationship of Romeo and his fair Juliet, we have been looking at the deeper and alternate meanings of key quotes from key scenes to develop our skills at reading this difficult language in Renaissance




history. We have also been developing our editing skills by spending time reviewing our own work to improve our writer's craft.


Maple and Ash: We have been learning key skills to assist us in the completion of Language Paper 1 tasks. We have developed our description skill whilst editing our own work to develop our craft further and also started working through some talking mocks in readiness for year 11.

**Willow**: It was full steam ahead for Willow, we carried out no less than four walking mocks in preparation for the Summer Exams and completed a carousel of learning to develop our individual skills and confidence at tackling key questions we individually needed further practise.











Key stage 4: This Summer was our exam's term. Year 11 sat their GCSEs and the last of their Functional Skills Exams. Our Year 10 also sat Functional Skills Exams. Year 10 had a busy time continuing with working through the curriculum, including topics on Representing and Interpreting Data, Mental and Written Methods and Number Sense, Indices and Roots and Manipulating Algebraic Expressions. Amongst other things, we looked at Pie Charts, Bar Charts and Graphs, methods for working with decimals and fractions, breaking down multi-step problems, addition and subtraction rules for indices and simplifying expressions.

### Cedar have completed White Rose maths units:

Year 9: 'Ratio and proportion': solving problems with direct and inverse proportion; conversion graphs and solving 'best-buy' problems.

'Probability': single event probability and relative frequency.

Year 8: 'Indices': adding/subtracting expressions with indices; simplifying algebraic expressions by multiplying/dividing indices. 'Area and perimeter of trapezia and circles': calculating area of triangles, rectangles, parallelograms and trapezium; calculate area and perimeter of compound shapes; investigate the area of a circle.

#### Blossom have been learning to tell the time.

Telling the time is a key skill and the young people have worked hard to tell the time to o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to the hour as well as in 5 minute intervals on analogue clocks. In recent lessons, we have been learning another life skills, handling money!





Science: Blossom have learned about teeth and their functions, the digestive system, food chains and animal teeth. We have conducted an experiment to see the effect different drinks have on our teeth and to see how the digestive system works. We have also labelled parts of a flower, found out how water is transported around a flower, how seeds are pollinated, seed dispersal and the life cycle of a flowering plant.

Each week we concentrated on a different aspect of our build



We researched the history of the Coronation Chair as part of the crowning of King Charles III and unanimously thought this would be a great idea for our concept and wanted to include as much different wildlife as possible.

We tried out our initial plan with some pallets from school site by painting all the pieces with brown fence paint donated to us. We then started collecting materials we might need and wanted to include.





To make our chair colourful and to show it's purpose we made clay tiles depicting insects and after glazing them we added them to the back of our Coronation Chair. Everyone involved signed our chair in homage to the graffiti on the real Chair. We stuffed tin cans with sticks, twigs, teasels, sawdust, soil and leaves to make lots of inviting places for different insects to live in.





We made grass snakes/caterpillars using old tights stuffed with grass seed and compost and waited to see them sprout and grow. We found more big pallets that we used as platforms. We then added bird tables, posts with holes in for bees, roof tiles for creatures such as frogs to hide in, a small pond for vital water and outdoor mats for sitting and to watch the wildlife arrive.





We planted Sweet peas and edible peas, Royal red, white and blue bedding plants for the arms of the chair as well as lavender for the bees, various herbs and sunflowers.

We checked on the peas and chose the ripest looking pod, picked and tasted the peas. Delicious!





Blossom group worked hard on the Bug Hotel competition. They planted bulbs, re-potted plants, built a frame to support the climbing plants and collected cones for the coronation chair. Every week they watered and tended the garden...





... and the bugs came!

Now, our **CREATIVE COMFORT CORONATION CHAIR** needs tending and watering as we enjoy watching the wildlife it attracts- walking, crawling, flying and buzzing by.
